## LAND Trust Report

Our School Community Council is in charge of approving our School LAND Trust Plan and accompanying budget. Central received \$66,477 in LAND Trust money.

The bulk of the budget went to paying for aides. Aides are used to support students using an intervention program. Every grade level receives a half hour of intervention time every day. Interventions are based off a needs assessment that is also administered by aides.


Some money is used to pay teachers to work extra days during the summer to collaborate. These days give the teachers a head start on the year to plan for specific needs of the group coming in.

Lastly, money was used to replace old and broken Chromebooks. Chromebooks are used in every grade level every day and are a key tool for instruction and assessment.

Central also received TSSA funds in the amount of \$19,805. This money was used to make a student success room and to pay for a music specialty teacher in conjunction with the BTS Arts grant.

Central continues to perform well for our demographics which are 45% on free and reduced lunch and 17% minorities. We are pleased with this progress and we appreciate the efforts of teachers, students, and parents in helping to attain this achievement. We are grateful for the many parent volunteers who help students on a daily basis. Involvement at home is undoubtedly the most important kind of parent involvement. We appreciate the support parents give by talking to their children about school, providing a quiet place to do homework, and teaching them respect for others and responsibility for their own behavior. We also appreciate your support of Parent/Teacher conferences, the Christmas Sing, Art Nights, the Dance Festival, the School Play, PTA activities, Grade Level and Classroom programs, and all other activities available at Central.
